What Sibshops are... And are not...

Sibshops are "events" – a time to celebrate being a sib

A time to acknowledge the good, not-so-good, and in-between times

Are not therapy, although the effect may be therapeutic













Sibling Support Project Goals

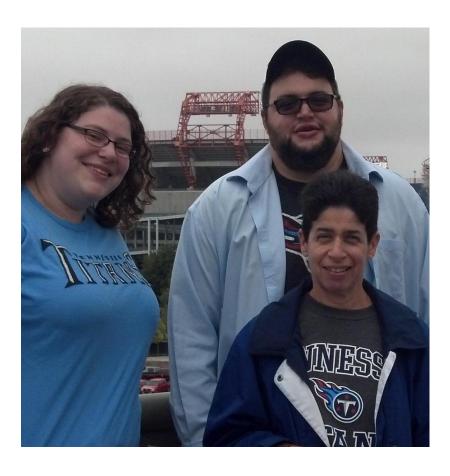
To provide brothers and sisters of children with special needs an opportunity to:

- meet other siblings in a relaxed recreational setting
- discuss common joys and concerns with other siblings
- learn how others handle situations commonly experienced by siblings of children with special needs
- learn more about the implications of their brothers' and sisters' special needs

To provide parents with an opportunity to learn more about common concerns of brothers and sisters



University of Washington Study on Impact of Sibshops



- 90% Said Sibshops had a positive effect on their feelings toward their siblings.
- 2/3 Said Sibshops taught them coping strategies
- **3/4** Reported Sibshops affected their adult lives.
- 94% Said they would recommend
 Sibshops to others

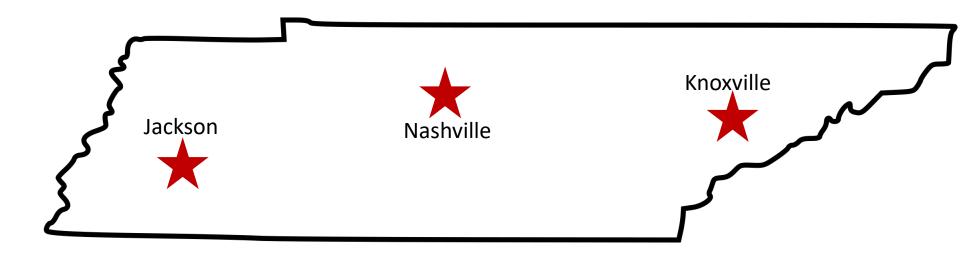
MISSION

Why do we need TABS?

Sibling relationships have unusual challenges and rewards

- Families feel strain of long-term support. In the U.S., 71% of the 4.9 million people with I/DD live with their families, yet only 7% of funding goes to family support services.
- Siblings are peer advocates.
 While they are in a unique position to support their brothers
 & sisters with I/DD (with perspectives different from parent caregivers), their needs are often overlooked.



Why do we need TABS?

Sibling relationships have unusual challenges and rewards



- "Club Sandwich" generation:
 Siblings often have to care for
 multiple generations of their
 families (aging parents, brothers
 & sisters with disabilities,
 children).
- Connect with others who understand: Share your experience and get needed resources, including assistance with planning for your and your sibling's future.

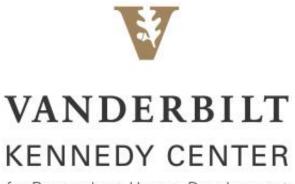
Why do we need TABS?

Sibling relationships have unusual challenges and rewards

- There are more than 100,000 adults and children in TN that have intellectual & developmental disabilities.
 - 75% of these individuals live with and are supported by their families and are not receiving paid long-term services and supports.
- When "disability" is defined more broadly, more than 975,000 Tennesseans have a disability.*
- It is safe to assume MANY of these individuals have siblings who offer varying levels of support to their brothers and sisters across the lifespan.

 Events for younger siblings (ages 8-13) that allow them to connect with other sibs, play games and have fun, and learn that they're not alone.

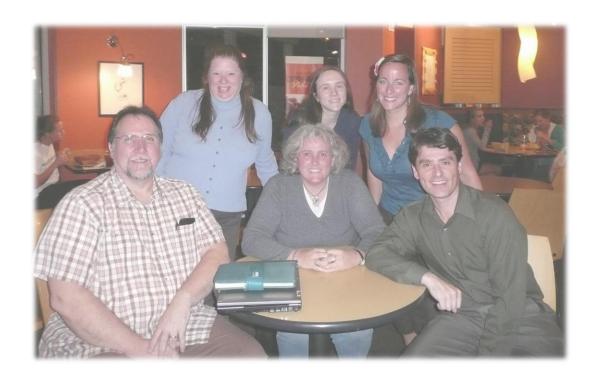


- Aug. 2016 Hosted a Sibshop facilitator training to grow the number of TN Sibshops.

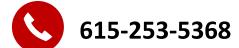
- Share info about TABS with other brothers, sisters and families in the disability community.
